THE FALC CATS

INTAKES

2020 and COVID changed everything for the number of cats F.A.L.C. took in. With COVID shutting down our local shelter, the local rescues were forced to step up and take in, vet, and care for more animals than usual.

In 2019, our first year operating, our intakes were at 66 and for 2020 we mangaged to rescue 320 felines (and 2 canines).

With the opening of our adult cat adoption center, Fat Cat Books, we were able to consciously expand our rescuing to the older kitties, bringing in multiple senior and adult cats.

We took in cats from citizens in Leon County, as well as surrounding rural shelters from Thomasville, Bainbridge, Moultrie and Franklin Co.





We are so blessed to have 2 new outlets for adoptions, in addition to Fat Cat Cafe. This past year, in May, we added the habitats at Petco at Governor's Square to our repetoir and in October we opened Fat Cat Books in Railroad Square.

The kitties we take to Petco only stay for 7 days, based on a policy we set in place, and then they go back to either of the adoption facilities. But rarely do they ever make it that long before getting adopted. Petco has helped find so many furrbabies new homes, we could not be more thankful for the opportunity.

Fat Cat Books was opened to cater to adult and senior cats, to get them out of the shelters or off the streets. While we dont see the adoptoin numbers rising quite as fast, because, as we all know, its harder to adopt out adults, we know that they are safe with us til they do find their furr-ever home. 

OUR FOSTERS

The process of saving a feline begins with knowing you have a safe place to keep them. That is why we value our fosters so much. They follow our policies and are diligent about giving the care needed to keep them well and safe.

OUR VOLUNTEERS

Outside of caring for the kitties, there are so many other moving parts. These parts dont move without our die-hard volunteers. Many of us would be burned out if it weren't for them picking up so many other tasks, from laundry to trips to vets, to helping at the facilities.

OUR EMPLOYEES

We are lucky enough to be able to pay employees to oversee our adoption centers. And we only employ dedicated, cat-knowledgable, reliable people who make running these facilities easier and safer while the rest of us can go to our "day jobs".



TRAP NEUTER RETURN

Trap neuter return (TNR) is a humane and effective technique for managing populations of feral, unowned, free-roaming community cats. Cats are humanely trapped, sterilized, and receive a rabies vaccine before being returned to their outdoor home. It's estimated that over 70% of kittens are born outside, and TNR effectively reduces the number of stray kittens being brought into animal shelters, vet offices, and rescues like us!

We are proud of our 50+ TNRs from this year! Many of them we consider "full circle" TNR. When we rescued kittens from an outdoor location, we revisited it to locate and sterilize any unaltered adult cats in the area, to break the reproductive cycle and prevent any more stray kitten rescues in that location.

We also had many community assists this year

- helping citizens spay and neuter their own pets. Often, people want to get their animals fixed, but they do not have the resources to do so. We were happy to help guide and assist through our partnership with Be The Solution!

Every fixed cat is a success, and one step closer to getting Tallahassee's community cat population under control!
